## LIFELINE DISCOUNT AVAILABLE

Lifeline is a federal program that provides a monthly discount on home phone, cell phone or internet service to eligible low-income households. If you qualify, the Lifeline assistance program provides a \$9.25 credit on your monthly internet service or a \$5.25 credit on your monthly home phone or cell phone service. Only one discount is available per household on either your home phone, cell phone or internet service. ## SCHOLARSHIP WINNER ESSAY

#### "How has the COVID-19 pandemic affected learning during your senior year?"
