Jacob Lewandowski of Groton Area High School, son of Brad and Becky Lewandowski



"If you could thank anyone for their guidance and support throughout your high school years, who would it be and why?"

Everyday, for the next four years, my dad would sit down with me before bed, asking how my goal was coming along. After four years, I am proud to tell him that his guidance and support paid off. For that, I will be forever thankful.

and there is no charge for the utilities to locate their facilities. By calling SD One-Call at least 48 hours before you dig, you can avoid costly bills that may be charged to you if facilities are cut. Calls to SD One-Call are answered 24 hours a day.
